Introduced by Cloyde Brown

A BILL for

AN ACT providing for a tax on fishing table of all kinds for the su port and building of new and now established fish hatcheries and othermeans of preserving Wyomings wild life.

BE IT Enacted by the legislature of the First Wyoming Boy's State.

Section 1.

1. This tax shall be levied on all fishing tackle and supplies as follows:

Fishing poles, fi hing leaders, line, flies, lures, creels etc.
Section 2. This try shall be levied at 2% on all tackle as listed above.
Section 3. Revenue raised from this tox shall be used solely by the State Game and Fish Commission for furthering a maintaining Tyoming's game and
